Location: Indonesia Event: A(H5N1) – Human Comments

- Beginning of May 2012, the Indonesian Ministry of Health reported to [WHO](#) a new A(H5N1) human case in Pekanbaru, capital of Riau province, in the Sumatra island (cf. map 1).
- The case was:
 - A 2 years old male,
 - Onset of symptoms on 17th April 2012,
 - He was hospitalised on 21st April and died on 27th April 2012.
- The last A(H5N1) avian outbreak in Indonesia was reported in March 2012 in Nusa Tenggara Barat province (cf. [eWEB n°210](#)).
- Since 2005, a total of 189 cases has been confirmed in Indonesia, including 157 deaths.
